

Northwest Metro Water Supply Work Group - Meeting Notes  
June 16<sup>th</sup>, 2010

Chris Elvrum of the Metropolitan Council moderated the meeting. Introductions were made, an attendance list is attached. **The next meeting is scheduled for October 20, 2010 1:00 at the Anoka County Government Center.**

**Updates on Related Activities/Reports**  
**Metropolitan Council**

Chris Elvrum reported on several activities the Metropolitan Council is conducting to continue the evaluation of regional water supplies.

**Pollution Control Agency**

Doug Hansen reported on the water quality assessments being conducted by the PCA. He also mentioned the work the agency is doing to add wells to the ambient groundwater monitoring network.

**Minnesota Department of Health**

Steve Robertson discussed the various wellhead protection grant programs that Health Department is currently administering. Lih-In Rezanian mentioned that the Health Department was working with others on notification procedures surrounding water supply facility break-ins.

**City of St. Francis (Eric Peterson)**

The city had had a high usage over the Memorial Day weekend.

**City of Brooklyn Park (Rick Luckow and Jon Watson)**

Continues to monitor water levels at 3 well nests to evaluate connections between aquifers and surface water. Working on evaluating water conservation. City is working on water treatment plant efficiencies.

**Champlin (Nancy Zeigler – WSB)**

The city is going to bring well #1 back online and has added a pressure filter to treat radium.

**Anoka County (Bart Biernat)**

As part of the Water Resources Management Plan for Anoka County the County is inventorying water resource outreach methods to look for opportunities to improve efficiencies.

Lih-In Rezanian discussed communities adding phosphates to sequester iron and manganese or to meet the lead and copper rule and the resulting discharge of phosphorus to surface waters. Her calculation was that it was around 7-8% of the phosphorus entering the metro wastewater treatment plant which is consistent with what Chris Elvrum found.

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
