

Expanding the Transit System: Draft 2040 Plan





Increased Revenue Scenario would also include 1% average annual bus expansion.








METRO System

- **Green Line Extension** (Southwest LRT)
- Blue Line Extension (Bottineau Corridor LRT)
- Orange Line (I-35 W South Bus Rapid Transit)
- Red Line Expansion (Cedar Avenue BRT)



Benefits of Light Rail Transit (LRT)

- Quiet, high capacity transit operations
- Service that operates 21 hours a day linking to regional destinations
- Frequent service with trains approximately every 10 minutes during peak travel periods
- Convenient station stops every ½ - 1 mile


Southwest LRT: Green Line Extension



Advisory Committee Purpose

- Serve as a voice for the community
- Advise Corridor Management and Community Works Steering Committees
- Provide input on design: stations, public art, operations and maintenance facility, bike, pedestrian, and park-and-ride facilities
- Identify impacts related to construction and operation of the light rail line
- Identify strategies to mitigate construction impacts
- Serve as information resource and liaison to the community



CAC Membership

- Community appoints members:
 - Minneapolis: 5 members
 - St. Louis Park: 3 members
 - Hopkins: 3 members
 - Minnetonka: 1 member
 - Eden Prairie: 5 members
- Corridors of Opportunity Engagement Grantees: 5
- At-large representation appointed by Met Council and Hennepin County Community Works: 3



BAC Membership

- Community appoints 2 members each:
 - Minneapolis
 - St. Louis Park
 - Hopkins
 - Minnetonka
 - Eden Prairie
- Chamber appoints 1 member each:
 - Minneapolis Regional
 - TwinWest
 - Eden Prairie
- At-large representation appointed by Met Council and Hennepin County Community Works: 5



Accountability

- Serve a 2-year term and attend meetings
- Actively participate in discussions; be a voice to advance the broader interests of community
- Report back to entity represented
- Provide feedback on communication and public involvement efforts
- Listen to and respect the viewpoints of others
- Accept outcomes of Met Council decisions



Advisory Committee Leadership

- Co-Chair appointments:
 - Corridor-wide perspective
- Co-Chair roles/responsibilities:
 - Lead committees through their tasks and ensure charter compliance
 - Identify topics/issues of committee concern
 - Develop meeting agendas with SPO and Hennepin County staff







Advancing the Design Process

Advancing Design from 30% to 60% Engineering

Corridor-wide:

- Station architecture/integrated public art
- Streetscape/landscape design
- LRT track features
- Roadway and trail details
- Bridges and tunnels
- Systems elements
- Freight rail features
- ADA features
- Incorporate changes developed through environmental review process

Unique elements:

- Operations and Maintenance Facility (OMF) in Hopkins
- Park and ride facilities



Station Design



Station Design Scope/Vision

- Provide architectural consistency with the Green Line and tie the SWLRT corridor together with a corridor-wide design approach
- Control construction and maintenance costs and learn from past projects
- Acknowledge the different communities and station sites along the SWLRT corridor
- Apply one of four identified station types based on previous public input and site observations

- Neighborhood Station
- Town Square Station



Integrated Public Art Scope

- Incorporate public art concepts into ongoing station design process
- Enhance unique identity of stations, aid in passenger wayfinding, promote transit use and community pride
- Reflect community values and histories

Kenilworth Corridor Landscaping

Kenilworth Landscape Design Scope/Vision

- Reflect existing setting of the Kenilworth corridor
- Design vegetation and landscape with trails, freight rail and light rail
- Ensure quality user experience



Design: Next Steps

- Seek appointments to advisory committees
 - Station Art Committees (SAC)
 - Kenilworth Landscape Design/Station Art Committee (KDLC/SAC)
- Initiate community engagement
 - Hold kick-off meeting with KDLC/SAC
 - Hold open houses on station prototype location and site elements
- Refine station prototype designs to reflect site and public input
- Select artists and hold kick-off meeting with the SACs
- Host public events seeking input on station design and public art design concepts



Kenilworth Channel Bridge Design Concepts

Kenilworth Channel Bridge Design Scope

- Incorporate Section 106 process for historic properties, considerations coordinated with design process
- Reflect input received from consulting parties
 - Maximize natural light between bridges
 - Create more space for skiers and kayakers
 - Use natural materials/dark colors
- Consider vegetation and bridge abutments along embankments
- Meet functional requirements that is tested with structural engineering



Kenilworth Channel Bridge Design Next Steps

- Continue review with State Historic Preservation
 Office (SHPO) and consulting parties
- Seek public comments at open houses Q2 2015



Advancing the Environmental Process

National Environmental Policy Act and Minnesota Environmental Policy Act

Supplemental Draft Environmental Impact Statement

- SDEIS will evaluate adjustments that may result in significant adverse impact from the proposed project since publication of the DEIS, including:
 - Eden Prairie alignment adjustments
 - Proposed location of the operations and maintenance facility
 - Kenilworth corridor/freight rail alignment



Next Steps

- SDEIS publication (conferring with FTA)
- Notice of Availability starts the 45 day public comment period
 - Document will be made available online and at public locations
 - Open House & Hearings will be held no earlier than 15 days after publication date
- Comments from DEIS and SDEIS will be responded to in FEIS and through engineering design refinement
- Mitigation will be included in the FEIS and Record of Decision (ROD)



Section 4(f) of the Department of Transportation Act

Section 4(f) Overview

- Requires consideration of publically owned parks, recreation areas and wildlife refuges and publically or privately owned historic sites during transportation project development
- Includes coordination with officials with jurisdiction
- Supplemental draft 4(f) analysis included in SDEIS
 - Updates draft analysis included in DEIS
 - Addresses adjustments made during preliminary engineering



Section 4(f) Next Steps

- Coordination with officials with jurisdiction
- Publish full draft 4(f) evaluation (conferring with FTA)
- Publish final 4(f) evaluation in Final EIS



Section 106 of the National Historic Preservation Act

Section 106 Overview

- Requires federal agencies to consider effects of project on historic properties
- Includes consultation with Section 106 consulting parties
 - MN State Historic Preservation Office
 - Cities of Eden Prairie, Minnetonka, Hopkins, St. Louis Park, Minneapolis
 - Hennepin County
 - Minneapolis Park and Recreation Board
 - Three Rivers Park District
 - Kenwood Isles Area Association
 - Cedar-Isles-Dean Neighborhood Association



Section 106 Next Steps

- Continue consultation with Section 106
 Consulting Parties
- Make determinations of adverse effects on historic properties impacted by the project
- Develop Section 106 Agreement
 - Identify measures to avoid, minimize, or mitigate adverse effects




